## What do you OBSERVE/HEAR?

- Jackie experienced a new emotion when listening to the National Anthem at the 1947 World Series.
- He felt included in Major League Baseball.
- He played an exhibition game in Georgia a year later.
- It was the first time blacks and whites played baseball together in Atlanta.
- Jackie thought what he has always believed in came true.
- He believed that imperfections are human.
- When humans are given space and time, these imperfections start to slowly disappear.
- Humans are not perfect.
- We need to deal with stumbling blocks and prejudices.
- Obstacles Jackie faced made him fight harder.
- Even though the obstacles were hard, his strong belief that he had a chance kept him going.
- He knew he had a chance because he lived in a free society.
- His fight wasn't against something he could not change.
- People with the same goals worked around him so there was a chance of improvement.
- He can tell people that they won't face the same problems because others before fought against them.
- Progress has to happen. There's a chance for change for everyone.
- Free people are always changing.
- Not everyone can succeed, because that would be perfection.
- But, if we put our past thinking behind us, we can cause great change.
- Jackie believes in the human race, the warm heart, integrity, the goodness of a

free society.

- Society will be good as long as people are willing to fight for it, and to fight against imperfections.
- Jackie's fight was against the color barrier of baseball.
- This was where he saw imperfection and what he could fight against.
- He knew it wouldn't be a losing fight because it took place in a free society.
- Jackie believes his faith in God helped him in his fight.

What is a main point Jackie Robinson makes? What evidence makes you think this is the main point?
